An Unheard Homily

(Some kind of cold got me down just around Christmas, and I didn't get to say Mass at New Year's. But I had already written a homily, and it sums up some things I think are important to say about Our Lady, so I thought maybe some of you would be interested in reading what I would have said. Fr P)

The shepherds made known what had been told them about this child; and all who heard it were amazed. But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. (Lk 2:16-21)

The shepherds told Mary that the angel of the Lord came to them and told them not to be afraid. The news that the angel brought was not just for them, but for everybody. A child was born in Bethlehem, and that child was sent by God to be the Savior of the world. And the shepherds heard the angels singing: *Glory to God in the highest, and peace on earth.*

These were the words that the Blessed Virgin Mary treasured and pondered in her heart: words about good news and God's gift of salvation. And they are the same words that we have heard throughout the Christmas season. But the question is how we can keep them in our hearts the way that Mary did.

It is fitting that we celebrate Mary's motherhood in the Octave of Christmas because of the part she plays in the Incarnation of Our Lord. It's a difficult concept: that God should have a mother. But we know that for our salvation, God decided to become man: *The Word was made flesh and dwelt among us.* And flesh-and-blood children have mothers.

The meaning of Christ's Incarnation is that we see that God is not distant or incomprehensible, but that God is present and active in the world around us. And this Presence is at the heart of our Catholic understanding of faith: that we approach God in the material reality of this world, through the Church that is the visible community of faith, and through her Sacraments, where we receive God's grace in the real intersection of the visible and invisible realms.

In other words, God is not somewhere else: He is here among us. And salvation is about what God is doing for us.

But Mary's motherhood also shows us that God does not do the things He does for us entirely on His own. Our salvation always depends on our cooperation with God's will. The old theologians used to speculate quite uselessly on how things all might have turned out differently: What if there was no sin, and humanity didn't need salvation? What if God decided not to send Jesus into the world? What if God decided to save us even if we didn't want to be saved?

It's like angels dancing on pins: it's all useless speculation, because sin *did* enter the world, and humanity *does* need to

be redeemed—and perhaps God could accomplish this in a million different and unimaginable ways, but the fact is that He chose to become man. *The word was made flesh, and dwelt among us.*

But God's vast plan for everyone's salvation depended entirely on the word of one woman, who was given the complete freedom and awesome power to say no to God. It's strange enough that God should have a mother, and even stranger that He would ask her how she felt about it. The angel of the Lord told Mary that through the power of the Holy Spirit she would conceive a Son who would be holy, and would be called the Son of God.

But the point is she had the freedom to say yes or no. God does not force anyone to do anything, and He will not even force us to love Him. It's a freedom that many don't really want; they think it would be better if God always made us be good, and kept us from making bad choices. But God gives us the freedom to say yes or no.

And Mary said yes: *Be it done unto me according to Thy word.* And by becoming the Mother of Jesus, she became the Mother of God, because Jesus is True God and True Man.

It's strange to think that God would let so much depend on a single human being saying yes or no What matters is that Mary said yes, but she didn't have to. In His infinite perfection and power, God does not actually need us for anything. The Creator of all things can accomplish everything on His own—even our salvation—and He could do it all for us and without us. But God wants us to enter into His love, so He asks us to help Him out, and God wants us to say yes.

Some of you probably do exactly the same thing with your children. It might be so much easier and quicker for you to set the dinner table by yourself, instead of letting your kids learn to put the plates and forks out where they should go especially if sometimes a plate gets dropped or a glass gets broken.

You could do it all for them and without them, but you ask them to help out, and you want them to say yes, because you want what's good for them. That's what love is about. Now maybe you don't give them the complete freedom and power to say no—but God always does, because that's what He has chosen to do.

And this is just how God deals with His children. In Jesus, we see God's infinite power united with Man's unlimited vulnerability. But in us, the balance between God's power and our own weakness depends on the terrible freedom that has been given to us: it is our freedom to turn away from God, to reject His love. God will never not force us to love Him--simply, because without freedom, it wouldn't be love. God always lets everything depend on whether we say yes or no.

And so, in this same freedom and power, Mary said yes and became the Mother of God. The Word became flesh and dwelt among us. And as we look to our Blessed Mother, she teaches us, who are her children, too, to treasure the Word of God and to ponder this in our hearts. She invites us to look to Jesus and to come to the table of the Lord, because she wants us to say yes to God.
